Realizing why EMS is important

Sunday afternoon my husband and I witnessed a tragic accident, then experienced the kindness of strangers, the timely response of local medical emergency services, and the support of our caring

I have never called 911, but as I rushed for my phone, then heard the calm voice of dispatch, I knew that soon the professional help that was needed would be on the way. I could feel my body start to relax the moment I heard the sirens, then saw the flashing lights carrying the paramedics, bringing calm into a storm of chaos

I had also never stood on the McCall airport tarmac waiting for the St. Luke's air ambulance to arrive, which made me realized

Road less-traveled beats road-less travel

On Tuesday night, just over a week before Halloween, a group of New Meadows and Adams County citizens began brewing up a concoction that should have city and county officials across the re-

Like many committees before them, the newly formed New Meadows Roads and Streets Committee is likely to be cast aside by most observers as yet another layer of government bureaucracy unlikely to yield any tangible results, but guaranteed to wa the hearts of the bureaucrats and do-gooders who sign up for such duties.

The committee, however, is on the verge of tapping into some of the most readily available r sources in the region—a glut of blue collar talent and a strong public distaste for substandard roads.

Roads have long been among the chief complaints of residents in New Meadows and across Adams and Valley Counties, but little ever changes becau turns out building and maintaining quality roads is an expensive endeavor in snow country. Look no further than the \$3+ million per year the City of McCall spends on roadway improvements, which is still a far cry from what would be needed to improve all McCall streets to adequate conditions.

Government funding alone might never foot the bill for quality roads, and so for decades residents have endured dusty neighborhood roads and bumpy, bone-jarring rides to the grocery store.

This will not change overnight, but as the New Meadows committee correctly pointed out, the talent to improve these roads is among us. Many of these people would be motivated to provide equip-ment, material or time to begin making incrementa improvements for pennies on the dollar.

To be clear, the committee assembled by New Meadows is only at the beginning of what is sure to be a long and arduous road-literally-even with only 1.5 miles of city roadway to contend with. Still, the "outside the box" thinking touted by members of the committee should be replicated by Valley County and the cities of Cascade, Donnelly and

how invaluable their service is to our community. I am convinced that without the timely assistance of the McCall paramedics, the St. Luke's McCall staff and air ambulance, and the incredible caring strangers who immediately rendered helped as needed, there would have been a different outo

I am still shaking as I think about how quickly life changed on what was a perfect end of summer afternoon. My heart car-ries deep gratitude for all who helped. We learned accidents happen any-where, anytime. We were extremely fortunate have received help from many, particularly the well-trained professional McCall paramedics and fire district team.

Please know this could one day be you having a similar experience and you could end up feeling as we do today. Our community cares and it supports one another. We learned that our emergency medical services save lives.

I share our experience so that when voting Nov. 5 you will consider the portance of voting yes to fund the Valley County EMS District contracts with the McCall, Donnelly, and Cascade fire districts. Each of us may one day need and invaluable emergency help. Accidents happen. Should you need to call 911, you want to know that someone will answer and

EMS funding request

One of the many things I've learned since being involved in communi-ty service, is the lack of funding available to help take care of our commu-nities. County and city budgets are capped at a small adjustment for new construction. This allows some basic salary adjustments for current staff and to cover small emergency purchases. When it comes to finding funding to cover the increased medical costs and need for additional EMS services,those funds are not available in existing budgets.

The current EMS levy severely under funds the needs of the community We can and should provide needed emergency services to our communi ty. When you call for help, there is an expectation that an ambulance and paramedic will show up to your door quickly. The commu nity is on the brink of not having this available. Also, with the new request for funding, a paramedic will be included in the team there to help.

They may be able to help you at your home witho a transport to the hospital. This would save residents the cost of a hospital visit. Basic life support only provides someone with basic
